Proclamation



WHEREAS: Indigenous Peoples of the Americas Day is sponsored by the Native American Symposium Committee, Native American Student Association, City of Fayetteville, Latin American and Latino Studies, the Center for Multicultural and Diversity Education and the OMNI Center for Peace, Justice and Ecology, and

WHEREAS: Indigenous Peoples Day began in 2004 when Dr. Dick Bennett, the founder of the OMNI Center for Peace, Justice, and Ecology in Fayetteville, recommended that the University of Arkansas host an observance in recognition of Indigenous Peoples Day, and

WHEREAS: each year we meet at the Trail of Tears Memorial Marker in Fayetteville to commemorate indigenous peoples and remember the Trail of Tears, which was the result of federal legislation declaring that no foreign government, which included American Indian tribes, could be physically located within the borders of the United States of America, and any tribe that failed to disband or move of its own accord to the specially-designated Indian Territory of present-day Oklahoma was forcibly removed by federal forces, and

WHEREAS: thousands of people died during this thousand-mile journey over the Trail of Tears, a collective reference to the many paths used by the Cherokee, Choctaw, Creek, Chickasaw and Seminole nations when they were forced west, and the forced removal of American Indians over the Trail of Tears is one of America's greatest tragedies, and


WHEREAS: John Benge led 1,100 Cherokees from their homelands in Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee through the frontier village of Fayetteville, Arkansas to "Indian Territory" as part of the forced removal of nearly 13,000 Cherokees ordered by President Andrew Jackson and the United States Congress, and this group of weary, homeless Cherokees camped on the hillside north and east of the historic Fayetteville marker, securing supplies and repairing wagons before heading west to Cane Hill the next day and on to Indian Territory, arriving there on January 17, 1839,

NOW THEREFORE, I, Lioneld Jordan, Mayor of the City of Fayetteville, Arkansas do hereby proclaim October 12, 2015 as

"INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF THE AMERICAS DAY"

in Fayetteville, Arkansas and urge all citizens to join me in focusing on the Trail of Tears in Fayetteville and Northwest Arkansas today.
