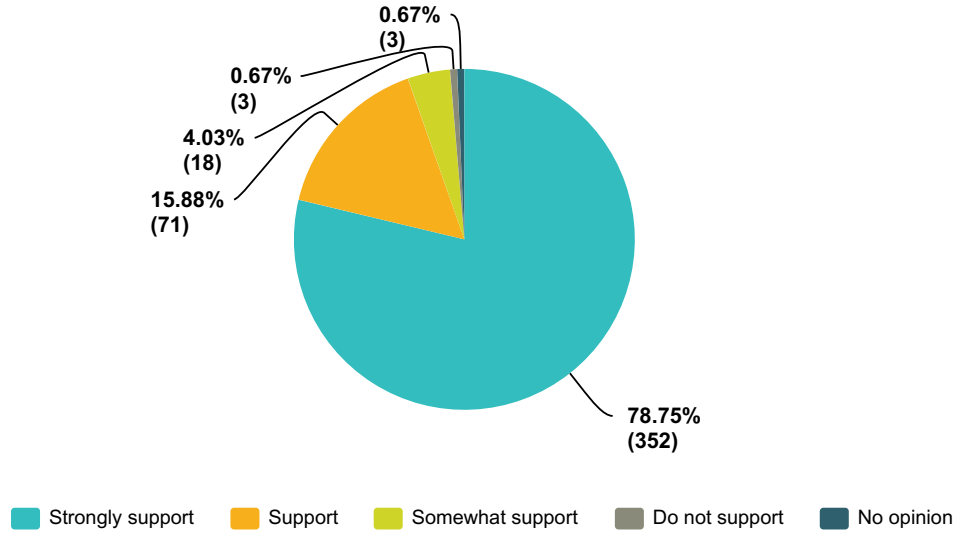


Q1 Do you support the City's efforts to develop and implement a plan to divert 80% of our waste from the landfill?

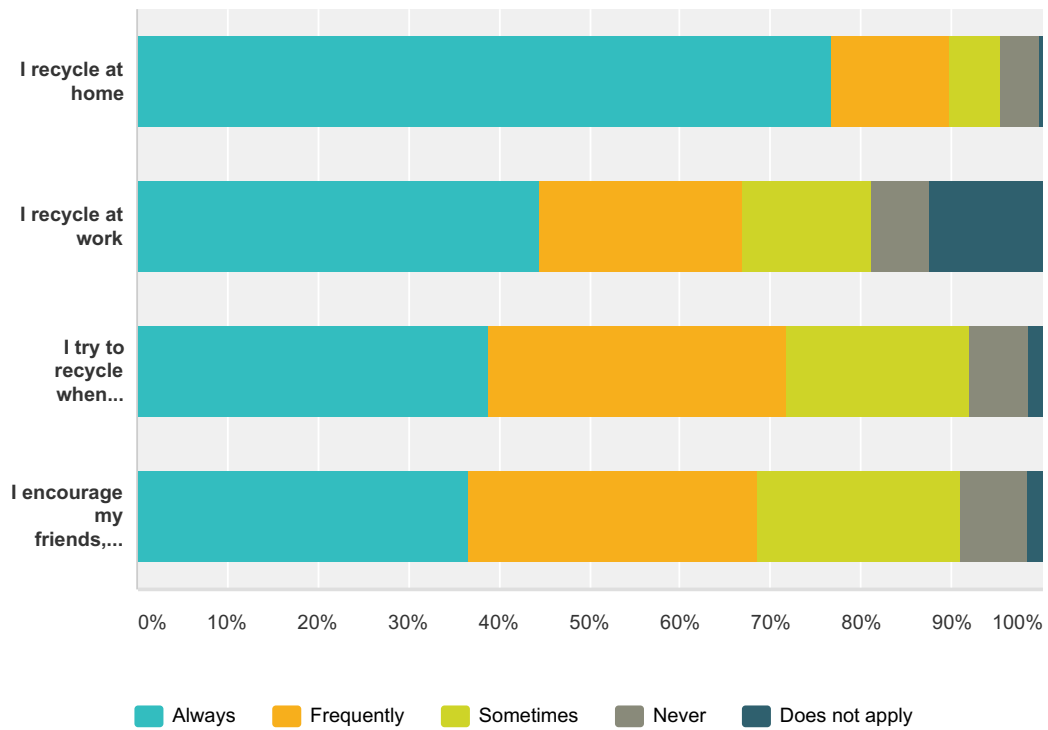

Q2 How often do you recycle? Please check all that apply.

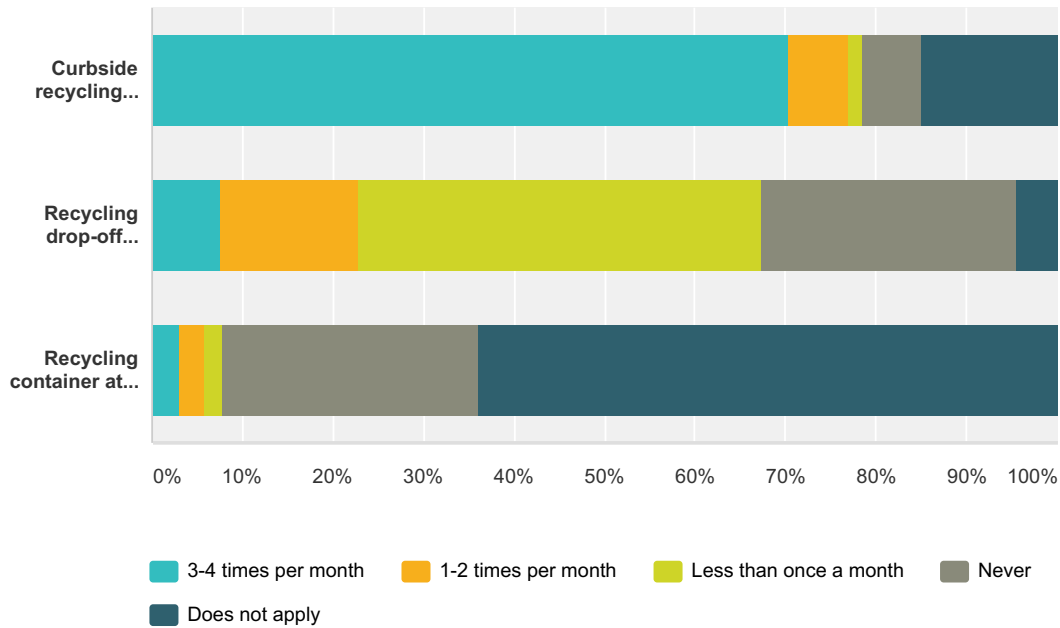

Q11 Do you own or rent your current home?

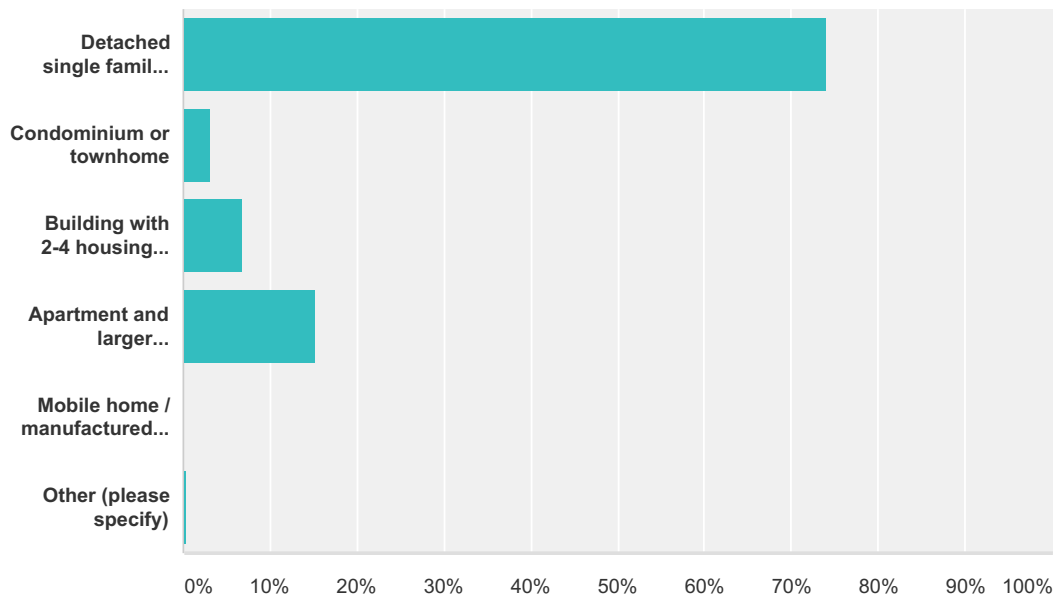

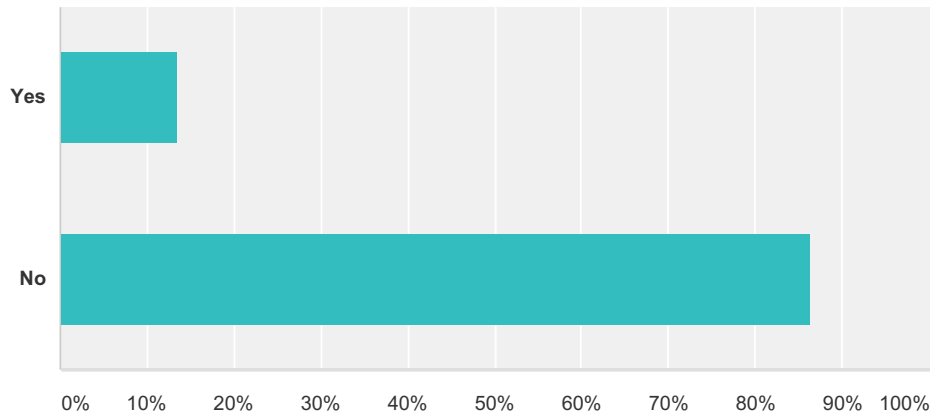

Q13 Are you a University of Arkansas student?

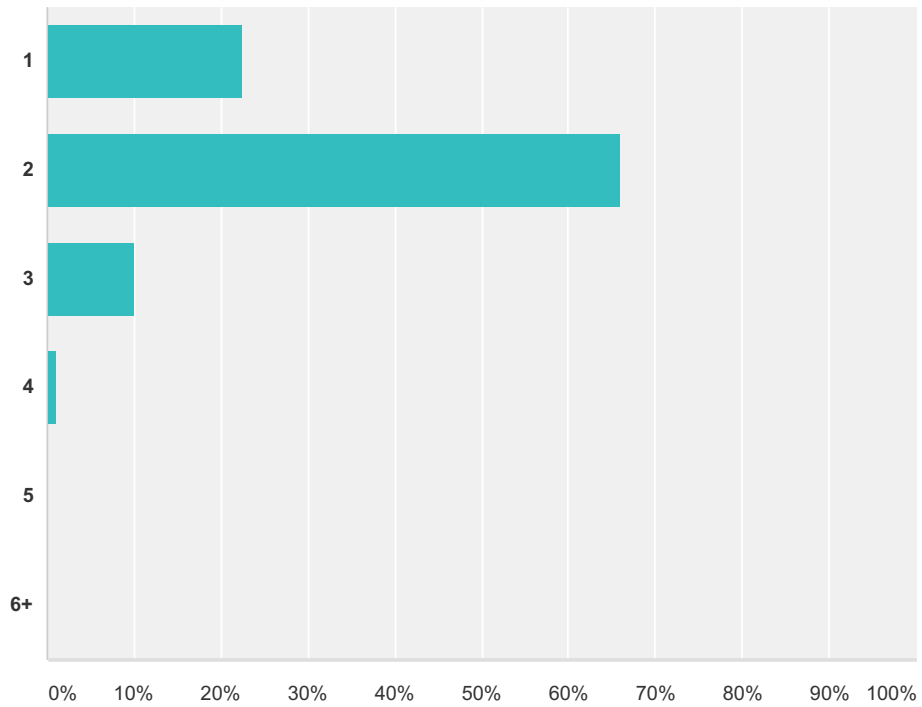

Q14 How many adults (age 18 or older) live in your household?

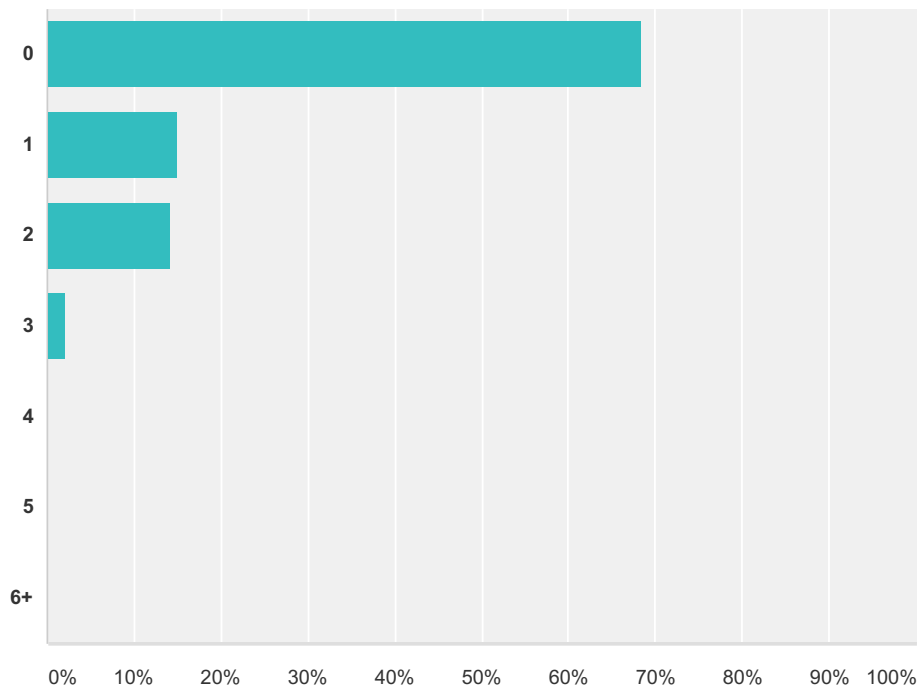
